



SOLDIER OF THE MONTH

"The thorough training given me by the Army has helped me cope with almost every conceivable situation," T/Sgt. Junior J. Spurrier, holder of the Medal of Honor, told recruiters when he recently reenlisted and was assigned to recruiting duty at Richmond, Va.

It was more than courage that earned for Spurrier the Medal of Honor, Distinguished Service Cross, Bronze Star, Purple Heart with cluster, Croix de Guerre, EAME ribbon with six bronze service stars, and the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with three bronze service stars. Sergeant Spurrier not only mastered the techniques and operation of his own weapons, but those of our allies and of the enemy as well.

In France, in 1944, his infantry company attacked the village of Achain from the east; Spurrier, a "one-man task force," advanced around the village and attacked alone from the west. Using both American and German weapons, despite heavy enemy action, he sustained his solitary attack, killing 28 Germans and capturing 22 more. His courage and combat knowledge earned the Medal of Honor for him in this instance.

Following his discharge in June 1945, he went into business for a brief period but, having a preference for the Army, he rejoined and was given his present recruiting assignment.

"I owe the Army much," Sergeant Spurrier said, "and I stress the importance of technical training to the men I sign up. I enjoy my Army work and feel sure that enlistees will be able to say the same thing."
