Maj. Gen. (Ret) Krase Inducted into 35th Division Hall of Fame

MG (Ret) Lloyd E. Krase served from the rank of Private in an Infantry Squad to the Commander of the 35th Infantry Division (Mech) during a 40-year military career. Wounded twice in Vietnam as an Infantry Platoon Leader, his awards included the Silver Star, Legion of Merit, Bronze Star w/OLC, Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal,, Air Medal, Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry, and the Combat Infantryman's Badge. He commanded several Companies, the 1st Bn, 137th Inf; the 69th Inf Bde; and the 35th Inf Div (Mech). He served as Chief of Staff for the 35th Div and the Kansas National Guard. He was an expert in infantry tactics and Battalion, Brigade, and Division-level maneuver operations.

Brigadier General Mohatt was commissioned a Second Lieutenant on 20 July 1990 through the Kansas Army National Guard Officer Candidate School. After graduating the Armor Officer Basic course at Ft. Knox, Kentucky, he has served in a variety of command and staff positions as a traditional National Guard Soldier in Kansas. After completing Armor Advance Course, Ft. Knox, Kentucky and Combined Arms and Services Staff School (CAS3), Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, BG Mohatt served as an Armor Company Commander and then received the opportunity to attend resident Command and General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas. After serving a year as a plans officer at the 35th Infantry Division, Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, he deployed to Germany in support of Operation Enduring Freedom as an Infantry battalion operations officer (S3). BG Mohatt returned home and then deployed to Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom as an Infantry battalion executive officer (XO). BG Mohatt commanded 2nd Combined Arms Battalion, 137th Infantry Regiment (KSARNG) deploying them to Saudi Arabia in support of Operation Friendship One and to the Gulf Coast in support of Hurricane Gustav relief operations. Following Battalion Command, BG Mohatt served as a brigade S3 and completed the Army War Col-

For those that were not lege (DDE), Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania, as he assumed Command of the 69th Troop Command, KSARNG. After Brigade Command, BG Mohatt served as **Deputy Commanding General** - Operations, 35th Infantry Division, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. He currently serves as the Commander, Kansas Army National Guard and Assistant Adjutant General Land Component.

BG Mohatt's civilian education includes a pair of bachelor degrees from Kansas University, a master of arts from Wichita State University, and master's degrees from the Command and General Staff College and the United States Army War College.


President's Reception

Plat Sgt. Long and SSG Holmes inducted into 35th Division Hall of Fame


Three more heroes of the 35th Infantry Division were inducted as part of Class XI of the 35th Division Hall of Fame in a ceremony on Sept. 7, 2019, held at the Kansas City Airport Hilton. They were SSG Frank Holmes, killed in action in WW II; MG Lloyd E. Krase, a Distinguished Service Cross recipient of the Vietnam War and former commander of the 35th Division; and PSG Noel Long, a WW II veteran.

The 35th Division Hall of Fame is located in the Museum of the Kansas National Guard, Topeka, KS.



PSG Noel Long

Plat Sgt Noel R. Long served heroically as a Platoon Sergeant in Co F, 137th Inf, 35th Div, during WW II, and was an active member of the 35th Division Assn. until his death on Sept. 27, 2009 while returning from the 35th Div Conference in Topeka. Mobilized in 1940 with Co F, 137th Inf, Kansas City, KS, he trained with the 35th Div from then until it's landing on Omaha Beach, France on July 6, 1944. He became the Platoon Sergeant during the battle of St. Lo and served in that capacity for the rest of his time in combat. He was wounded first in Normandy, then during the Battle of the Bulge on the Rhine Herne Canal, ending his wartime service. He maintained his contacts with his wartime friends for the rest of his life.



action on Dec. 27, 1944, near Bastogne, Belgium during the Battle of the Bulge after six months of combat and four years of service in "doing what he had to do." Mobilized in 1940 with Co M, 3d Bn, 137th Inf. as a Machine Gunner, he trained with his unit until they landed on Omaha Beach on July 5, 1944. He was wounded on July 31, 1944 near Torigni sur Vire south of St. Lo during a fierce confrontation with crack German paratroopers, but quickly recovered. He fought through the battles of Normandy and was with his unit when it crossed the Saar and Blies Rivers. He was killed by artillery shrapnel while undergoing heavy enemy fire on Dec. 27, 1944.

BG Ed Gerhardt, chairman, called the meeting to order and reviewed the criteria for selection into the 35th Division Hall of Fame from the Rules and Regulations. It was emphasized that

- 1. Primary consideration should be given to extraordinary meritorious service in the 35th Infantry Division (which includes organic and attached units) and is supported by wartime or peacetime service accomplishments which reflect merit beyond that of being routine.
- 2. Secondary consideration should be given to service rendered in war and peace to the 35th Infantry Division, the 35th Division Association, and other services outside the military community, but which reflects favorably upon the nominee's service to the community, state, and nation, the 35th Infantry Division, the 35th Division Association, and uniformed services of our nation.

The selection process was reviewed, emphasizing that each member would vote for three (3) candidates this year, with candidates required to have a minimum of seven (7) votes (a majority of the committee present) for selection, with re-voting until that occurs. It was further emphasized that nominees not selected will again be considered the following year, and for five consecutive years if not selected. Upon non-selection after five consecutive years, the nomination will be withdrawn, although it may be resubmitted after revision

A total of ten (10) nomination packets were submitted. Nominees considered included PFC Lewis Barondeau, MAJ William Denney, 1st Lt Stevie F. Fox, CPT Otto Hine, T/Sgt Clarence Kemper, COL William H. Sachs, Jr., Staff Sgt Ralph L. Shear, T/Sgt/Maj Norvin Vogel, Sgt James T. Winslow, and CPT Edwin Young.

Following review of and voting on the nomination packets, the following were selected for 2020 induction into the 35th Division Hall of Fame:

T/Sgt Clarence T. Kemper

The confidentiality of the committee process was emphasized, as well as the names of those selected until the announcement at Saturday evening's banquet.



Three Selected for Class XII 35th Division Hall of Fame

Three more heroes were selected for the 35^{th} Division Hall of Fame for induction in 2020 at the 35^{th} Div Assn Conference in Kansas City.

They are Major William M. Denny (WW II), Captain (Doctor) Otto L. H. Hine (WW I), and Tech Sergeant Clarence T. "Click" Kemper (WW II).

Major William M. Denny commanded Co C, 134th Inf Regt, 35th Inf Div, during combat action in World War II, receiving a Silver Star, two Bronze Stars, a Purple Heart, and the Combat Infantryman's Badge for heroic actions across France, Belgium, and Germany. A native of St. Louis, MO, he was mobilized with the 35th Division in 1940. He received Bronze Stars at Morhange and Puttelange, France. For capturing the town of Habkirchen, Germany, Co C received the Distinguished Unit Citation and Major Denny the Silver Star, He was captured during the Battle of the Bulge and spent time as a POW. After rescue he remained in the Army and was medically discharged in 1947. He died in 1999.

Captain (Doctor) Otto L. Hine, Muskogee, Oklahoma, received the Distinguished Service Cross during the Meuse Argonne Offensive of WW I while with the Medical Detachment, 139th Inf Regt, 35th Inf Div. Trained as a dentist, he volunteered when WW I broke out in 1917. He was in charge of an Aid Station at Chaudron Farm, France, when the 139th Inf withdrew, leaving the Aid Station exposed to German artillery fire. He went behind the lines to secure artillery counterfire, then returned to the Aid Station to assist in the successful evacuation of his 94 patients. During that time he required treatment for exposure to mustard gas. After some Post-WW I service, he returned to dental practice in Oklahoma. He died in 1962.

Tech Sergeant Clarence T. "Click" **Kemper** received two Purple Hearts and the Bronze Star for heroic actions as a Platoon Sergeant in Co M, 137th Inf, during WW II. He joined the 35th Inf Div at Camp Robinson, AR in 1941, and remained with Co M until the end of the war. He received his first Purple Heart at St. Lo, France, his second during the Battle of the Bulge, and the Bronze Star for heroic actions with his Machine Gun Section at Livarchamps, Belgium on Jan 2, 1945. He served on occupation duty when the war ended, and returned with his unit in Sept. of 1945. Following discharge, he returned to his home in Forest Grove, Oregon, where he enjoyed baseball, fishing, and other sports until his death.



New Monument in Achain, France

On September 15, 2019, the French Association "Portes de la Mémoire" and their President Guy Reichert reveiled a new monument for the Division in the center of Achain, France.

The battle at Achain, France in November 1944, was one of the greatest battles fought by the 2nd Battalion of the 134th Infantry Regiment. The city is also known for the actions of James Spurrier, Jr. who received the Medal Of Honor. On November 13, 1944, Spurrier singlehandedly attacked and fought Germans in the village of Achain, France. Spurrier repeatedly returned to his company's command post with prisoners, and replenished his ammunition from both American and enemy weapons to continue his attack on the occupied village.

The monument is dedicated to the soldiers of the 134th Infantry Regiment that lost their lives to liberate the city.





International Liaison Committee Column

October 9, 2019

A blue and white dove surmounting a red "75" was the theme of the year in France.

A variety of events celebrating the 75th anniversary of the liberation involved 35th Division support groups across the country.

Jean-Francois Percy, president of the Santa Fe "Normandie" Association, recalled several meals and ceremonies honoring 75 visitors from the Nebraska National Guard Museum Association. Nebraska guardsmen furnished the initial soldiers in the 134 Regiment.

Percy was honored to meet Major General Daryl L. Bohac, adjutant general for Nebraska, as part of the celebrations.

Two busloads of the museum supporters spent three days in the hedgerow area around Saint Lo. Mayors of Conde sur Vire and La Meuffe provided meals for the visitors. The "Normandie" association paid for a meal at Saint Lo.

Several members of the "Normandie" association were thrilled to receive rare 110 Medical Battalion crests. Other offerings included challenge coins and French-American flag pins.

Nebraska Senator Mark Kolterman traveled with the group. The mayor of Seward, NE, gave a proclamation to the mayor of Saint Lo. Photos will follow in a later edition of the "Santa Fe Express."

The city of Nancy also honored the Nebraska museum group with a ceremony at its city hall. The group also paid a short visit to the museum of L'Espace de Memoire Lorraine 1939-45 at Veslize. The Espace association researches and educates about all aspects of the 1939-45 war in Lorraine. Most of the association members live in the area around Nancy that was liberated by the 35th Division

Doug Hartman of the Nebraska NG Museum tour presented the Espace museum with a map of the Nancy Mirecourt area that had belonged to Col Butler Miltonberger, commander of the 134 Regiment. Hartman inventoried and reclassified Miltonberger's papers for the Nebraska Historical Society and Archives. He rescued the map that was being discarded. A ceremony at Flavigny, south of Nancy, marked the beginning of liberation ceremonies for Nancy. A large stele outside the bridge over the Moselle at Flavigny honors the 35th Division who "fought in our area and died for our peace and freedom." The stele cites the 2nd Battalion of the 134 Infantry Regiment. It was virtually decimated by a German counter-attack when the infantrymen were crossing the bridge.

A special addition to this year's ceremony was a large group of school children who sang the "Star Spangled Banner" in English while waving American Flags.

Many groups and individuals were celebrated during an intense period of wreath-laying around Nancy.

An event special to the writer occurred at Armaucourt, northeast of Nancy. The event honored the mayor of Armaucourt, Aime Gabriel, who was executed by the Nazis on September 9, 1944 for refusing to requisition the villagers' food for the occupying forces. The mayor's granddaughter, Ghislaine Beyel, planned the event at her grandfather's plaque on the side of the church.

Mme Beyel arranged to have my father's name read at the ceremony. My father, Pvt. Richard Harlan Evans, was killed at Armaucourt September 30, 1944. His name leads the wording on a plaque on the same side of the church. The plaque is dedicated to my father and "his comrades of the 35th American Infantry Division who gave their lives for our freedom and to their American orphans.

A ceremony to dedicate a new memorial to the 35th Infantry Division was held at Achain. In addition a memorial ceremony honoring the war dead of the 35th Division was held in September in Agincourt, France. See Mike Ven's articles in this issue of the Santa Fe Express.

Michele's father's steps in Europe when he was with the 35th Division in World War II. Michele's father, was S/Sgt Clarence (Click) T. Kemper. He was with Company M of the 137th Infantry Regiment. He landed on Omaha Beach with the Division in July 1944, and fought through with them to the end of the war. He is the recipient of three Purple Hearts, and a Bronze Star. He received the Bronze Star for "heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy of the United States in the vicinity of ***, Belgium on 2 January 1945." We know now that he received this Bronze Star near Lutremange, Belgium.

We have received two early reports from the Anonsens on their trip. They were able to locate where S/Sgt. Kemper was wounded the first time with the help of Michael Yannaghas, of the Madeleine Chapel Memorial Association. The couple toured the Espace de Memoire Museum with Guy Reichert, Jerome Leclerc and members of the Espace de Memoire Museum a few days later.

Patrick Beck, of the US Veterans Friends-Luxembourg, and the 7th Company, 35th Division, Luxembourg prepared detailed maps and location descriptions for them for when they entered Belgium and

Luxembourg. Patrick will be in Scotland and will not be able to greet the American visitors. The Anonsens will continue their travels stopping in villages liberated by the 35th Division until their destination at the Elbe River. A full report of their adventures will be presented in a later issue of the SFE.

Richard vanKessell from The Netherlands reports that he is busy preparing special exhibits for an Operation Grenade Exhibition depicting battles in the Roemond area in the Netherlands in February and March of 1945. The 35th Division will be part of that exhibit.

Richard also reports that The Faces of Margraten Committee's goal is to find 7,500 pictures of soldiers buried in the Margraten Cemetery before the end of the war celebrations in May, 2020. Richard serves on the Faces of Margraten Committee. There are many 35th Division soldiers buried in the Margraten Cemetery.



Agincourt and the Sugar Loaf Battle

The Sugar Loaf Battle Association in France remembered our soldiers who paid the ultimate sacrifice during those severe days in September 1944 and to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the Liberation of Agincourt in France.

The monument is located at Agincourt, a small town near Nancy, France. It is dedicated to all the soldiers who were Killed in Action or Died of Wounds during the Battle of Sugar Loa, September 16-21, 1944. The official Dedication Ceremony was held on Sunday, September 20, 2015.

Sugar Loaf was the nickname of the hill close to Agincourt, France. This was a key terrain feature. It rose, a knob independent of other hill systems, to a height as great as that of the Plateau de Malzeville, and afforded excellent observation in every direction. It commands practically the entire valley. That is why it was such an important object for the Division.

The people of Agincourt are still very grateful. Emmanuel Peignier, President of the Sugar Loaf Battle Association organizes a ceremony every year in memory of our soldiers.

DRAFT Minutes of 35th DIV Association Executive Committee, Nominating Committee and Annual Meeting conducted on 7 Sep 2019

Submitted in October 2019 Edition of Santa Fe for review and comment.

I've consolidated the outcome of the actions taken at the Executive Committee, Nominating Committee and Annual Meeting by subject area. This seems prudent given the issues discussed by Executive Council Members were presented and discussed at the Annual Meeting for approval.

Review & Approval of the 102nd Minutes from Kansas City, MO written by COL (Ret) Robert Bloomquist were published in the Santa Fe Express following the 2018 reunion and handed out at the reunion. It was moved and approved to accept those minutes as written.

102dh Conference Reunion Report: The conference attendees for the Friday tour event continues to be smaller each year with about 20 in attendance. The President's reception was well attended by the 35th Division Staff, the Hall of Fame attendance was the highest in years and about 200 attended the dining out hosted by the 35th DIV Commander. The names of those that sponsored the conference were included in the conference program and will be published in the October edition of the Santa Fe.

Nominating Committee Report: COL (Ret) Cal Warrem, Vice President, Chaired the committee in the absence of COL (Ret) Angelo P. Demos, Chairman. He conducted the meeting and presented the recommendation of the Officers and Executive Committee at the Annual Meeting. The list of Officers and Executive Committee are enclosed in this edition of the paper.

Hall of Fame Committee Report: BG (Ret) Ed Gerhardt provided a separate report published in the Oct 2019 edition.

KSARNG/35th Division Museum Report: A verbal report discussed the continuation of educational events at the museum and comments were made again this year about the excellent newsletter that BG (Ret) Gerhardt, (President, Museum Board) publishes. If you do not receive this museum newsletter that includes events, new exhibits, etc., consider becoming a member of the museum. (Application is in each Divisionnaire) It was also noted that the 35th Association has great representation on the Museum Board of Directors: These are BG (Ret) Gerhardt, CW4 (Ret) Bush, COL (Ret) Bloomquist, COL (Ret) Warrem, and CSM (Ret) Putman. The Association donated \$5,000 to assist with operating funds from the Museum Capital Improvement Fund.

Outreach Committee Report (formerly publications committee): Murray Leff, Chairman was absent from the conference, however the following issues were introduced and discussed. We currently have approx. 470 members receiving the DIVISIONNAIRE newspaper which is our largest expense. In addition, complimentary papers are sent to several units that are assigned to the 35th Division in Kansas and Missouri. It was discussed and decided we would continue with 4 yearly issues of the Divisionnaire. The cost of each edition ranges from \$1200-\$1400 de-

pending on size, time of article preparation, and number/location of recipients.

International Committee Report: Marilyn Jensen and Paula Baker discussed the continuous involvement of our international partners and the efforts overseas to educate youth on the sacrifices of our soldiers. They were thanked by the members for the relationship they built and maintained over the years and sharing this in our "Santa Fe"

Historian's Report: Capturing and sharing the 35th History is accomplished in many ways through association activity. The Hall of Fame ceremony and display in the museum, the Divisionnaire published every quarter, sponsorship of the museum operating costs allowing it to be open 6 days a week, Mike Ven's "remembering our Veterans posts almost daily, Roberta Russo's website, the International connection to capture what actions are ongoing to remember the sacrifices overseas. One of our proudest is the assistance in the MIA Recovery Project over the years: Here is the lasts update on the most recent project:

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) confirmed that Unknown Soldier X-4 was disinterred in June and is currently under analysis as a possible match for Pfc. William Coleman, 134th Infantry, who was KIA in the Gremecey Forest on 1 Nov 1944. His remains were never recovered. We were able to locate and contact his niece who provided a DNA family reference sample. There is strong circumstantial evidence that Unknown X-4 is Pfc. William Coleman. The DNA analysis currently underway will provide confirmation one way or the other. Our thanks go out to Roberta Russo for leading this effort. Watch for updates in follow on papers.

Next Reunion The topic of the 103d Reunion in 2020 was discussed, several options were discussed. Since the 35th is scheduled to be home next year, they may want to host the dining out in conjunction with the conference. If that is the case, it may be in a location close to the Headquarters, Leavenworth Kansas or the Kansas City Airport area. If they decline to host the Dining out due to mission requirements, Oklahoma City and a few other states were discussed.

New Business: The search for a new Executive Secretary/Treasurer was discussed. COL (Ret) Bloomquist informed the committee that although retired from Active Duty, he still does contract work with the Army and owns a property business in Topeka and finding someone that can spend more time and help with great initiatives is needed. If anyone is interested, they should contact him for details on duties and time commitments. The Association does pay a small stipend, but the real reward is meeting or helping so many great patriots here at home and abroad.

Executive Secretary: There are some positive trends and unique challenges for the association. The support of the 35th Division leadership, in my opinion, has never been better. New memberships from the current soldiers was the best it has been since I got involved in 2009. The Division hosted the Dining Out for the second year and invited association members as guests. The financial health of the organization allows for continued business as usual due to generous donors currently supporting the organization. We have published four "Santa Fe Divisionnaires" this past year and thanks to numerous people providing articles, I believe are worth the value. The relationship between the museum and the association is great. Sadly, this is the first year without a WWII Veteran in attendance to the Conference. The Orphan's and families of WWII Vets are still superb supporters. The international relationship is strong. The Hall of Fame is still a gem of the organization. We have roughly 470 members. Working the delinquent list each year is an issue, but as indicated above, this has been the best year for new soldier Life and Annual memberships. These are updated in each "Santa Fe".

I am also recommending the Website be terminated. There are numerous websites that can capture the 35th Association events and news. The 35th Inf Division and the Museum have a website as well as Mike Ven's "Remembering the 35th Infantry Division WWII" is in Facebook. My thanks to COL Carla Hale and BG Ed Gerhardt for their involvement in the current website, and although the cost is reasonable, I feel it is time to use the other sites for information. (This was tabled for additional information and for any responses from the members.)

Challenges and Opportunities. There are two major challenges facing the association this year. As conference committee members have left due to age or interest, a major void in preparing for a quality conference is getting worse. The other is my replacement as Executive Secretary. At the 2018 Reunion I announced my desire to leave as Executive Secretary and announced it several times in the "Santa Fe" over the year. I've accepted a position at the Command and General Staff College which requires progression towards a Doctorate. I've provided options and ideas

to the Executive Staff below. With either option, I would be happy to keep the treasurer duties through the tax/fiscal year that for us ends 30 June 2020, if needed. We can do this due to my wife Betty's dedication to helping with administration.

Options on duties: My preference is to hand over duties entirely and would be nice if that person could be in Topeka for consistency in address and museum operations. However, I provided some options to consider. There are probably better ideas, so please offer if you have one.

- (1) Someone takes over as it is currently either in Topeka or KC/Leavenworth area. In my opinion, Topeka makes more sense due to address and Museum connection, but there are advantages to being closer to Leavenworth.
- (2) Split duties, maintaining address in Topeka, with treasurer in vicinity. **Treasurer** would do treasurer duties only: Mail pick up, make deposits, send receipts, pay bills, file taxes, etc. **Executive Secretary** would work the annual reunion, the newspaper, answer requests for information, membership drive, requests for corporate donations, reunion contracts, etc. This allows the option to hire the Exec closer to 35th DIV HQS for a better partnership.

Treasurer Report

Operating Funds: The financial health of the organization allows for continued business as usual due to generous donors currently supporting the organization. As of the 30 June 2019 fiscal year for our filing, the operating account was \$27,157.59. Although this varies by quarter due to expenses, publications, mailings, etc., it represents an average of the balance maintained throughout the year. My wife continues to capture all donations for publication in the Santa Fe and continues to offer categories as an option for members.







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Jean Mignon 1930-2019

A good friend of the 35th division in St. Lo passed away recently. Jean Mignon passed away during the night of August 10-11 at the age of 89, at his Saint-Lô, Normandy, home. He was born in 1930 - the elder of 3 children – in the German town of Trier, his father being a member of the French Army which had occupied the industrial area of the Rühr after the First World War, and remained in the

Saar until 1935.

On returning to Saint-Lô, Jean was educated at the Institute of Agneaux, a strict Catholic High School, and became an altar boy at Saint-Lô's Notre-Dame Church. It was here, while officiating in the morning mass of June 6, 1944, that he heard the stained-glass windows rattling. Caused by the shelling and bombing on the coast some 20 miles away, this announced the long-awaited D-Day.

The following day, after the terrible bombing the night before, the family left the still-burning town reverberating with the explosion of delayed-action bombs, to seek safety in the surrounding countryside. The street where they lived was luckily one of the two in the whole of the town not hit by bombs. After a month of wandering around from place to place away from danger, the 3 children and

their parents were able to return to their home. However, after just 24 hours, they were forced to leave Saint-Lô on July 9, when they with the rest of the townsfolk were ordered to leave by the Germans: so began what the locals call « the Exodus », the search for refuge as far away from the fighting as possible, mainly on foot. It was during this time that Jean had his first contact with Americans, when G.I.'s liberated his grandparent's village near Mortain, inevitably handing out, candy, Hershey Bars, and chewing gum to the children!

At war's end, the family made there way back to Saint-Lô, Jean finishing his education and then later finding a job in the *Préfecture*, the *Préfet*'s office. [In France, the *Préfet* is the state's representative in a *département*, responsible for safety, security, and the issuance of official identity documents]. At this time, Jean carried out his national service in the French Army in Morocco, and got married fathering 2 children. He was a militant trade unionist and a founder member of the local C.F.D.T., (the French Democratic Confederation of Labour) branch, a major French trade union created in 1964, close to the Socialist Party which he joined in 1974. However in 1977, Jean launched himself in Saint-Lô's local politics, standing for election with the Socialist party which won, but he himself turned down the offer to be Mayor and instead opted for the post of 1st Deputy Mayor. A faithful member of the Town Hall over 18 years during thre mandates, he held the positions of Town Councillor and Head of the Personnel and Social Affairs Departments.

In 1995, when his party was defeated in that year's municipal elections, Jean was appointed Keeper of the Chapel of la Madeleine which had just been opened as a memorial to the U.S. 29th and 35th Infantry Divisions. Over the next 20 years before retiring, he devoted himself to the Chapel giving his time to the many thousands of visitors who came to this memorial, particularly the younger generation to whom he taught the importance of the duty of remembrance of the sacrifice made by Allied soldiers in liberating France and Europe. And as someone who as a child had lived through the Occupation and the fighting, he could give them a first hand account of what it was like. He paid special attention to returning Veterans and their families: as he said « I had 20 years to say 'thank you' for what they did! »

Passionately interested in the history of his town, D-Day, the Battle of Normandy and French politics, Jean was a source of inspiration for many people and proud of the 35th Division Exhibit which he saw daily in the Chapel of la Madeleine.

Jean, a widower since 1991, is survived by his son and daughter and their families, and his sister and brother.
