I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and under authority contained in Circular No 32, Headquarters European Theater of Operations, United States Army, 20 March 1944, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded to:

First Lieutenant Albert L. Kessler, 01173675, Field Artillery, 65th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, 2nd Armored Division, United States Army, for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations. On 23 November 1944, Lieutenant Kessler, demonstrated extraordinary courage as a forward observer for an 8" howitzer battalion. Throughout the night, in order to destroy enemy positions, Lieutenant Kessler called for and adjusted fire which landed near his position which was well within the known safety limits from the center of impact. Although his observation post was within one hundred yards of the enemy lines, his persistent devotion to duty and total disregard for personal safety was largely responsible for the destruction of the heavily defended town. The extraordinary heroism and courageous actions of Lieutenant Kessler reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from New Jersey.
