ORIGINAL ORDER

I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE CROSS. By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and under authority contained in Circular No 32, Headquarters European Theater of Operations, United States Army, 20 March 1944, as amended, the Distinguished-Service Cross is awarded to:

First Lieutenant William W. Dodge, 01313870, Infantry, 320th Infantry Regiment, 36th Infantry Division, United States Army, for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against the enemy on 2, 3, and 5 January 1945 in Luxembourg. Lieutenant Dodge, on 2 January 1945, organized and led a daring assault against strongly fortified enemy positions, enabling the attacking echelons to advance and achieve their objective. The following day a neighboring platoon faltered when its leader became a casualty. Lieutenant Dodge, with complete disregard for his personal safety, crawled across open terrain through heavy enemy fire, reorganized it and then personally led both platoons to their objective. On 5 January 1945 the enemy counterattacked but under the inspiring leadership of Lieutenant Dodge, his men inflicted heavy casualties and succeeded in forcing the enemy to retreat. The extraordinary heroism and courageous actions of Lieutenant Dodge reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Missouri.

Technician Fifth Grade Martin E. Johnson, 16024994, Infantry, 47th Armored Infantry Battalion, 5th Armored Division, United States Army, for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against the enemy. On 6 December 1944, in Germany, Technician Johnson, continuously fired at the enemy from a position in the window of a building which had received eight direct hits from enemy heavy artillery. When the counterattack had been repelled, Technician Johnson discovered a wounded man lying in an exposed position 400 yards to his front. With utter disregard to his own personal safety, Technician Johnson dashed to the rescue through artillery and sniper fire, capturing five German prisoners on the way. The extraordinary heroism and courageous actions of Technician Johnson reflect great credit upon himself and are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Wisconsin.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By direction of the President, under the provisions of AR 600-45, 22 September 1943, as amended, and under authority contained in Circular No 32, Headquarters European Theater of Operations, United States Army, 20 March 1944, as amended, the Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Major Hardy S. Green, 0456483, Corps of Engineers, 147th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 10 May 1944 to 28 October 1944. Entered military service from Tennessee.

Second Lieutenant James E. Baker, 02001177, (then Staff Sergeant), Corps of Engineers, 147th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 6 June 1944 to 18 October 1944. Entered military service from Alabama.

Staff Sergeant Jesse L. Hicks, 34775490, Corps of Engineers, 172nd Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 1 October 1944 to 8 March 1945. Entered military service from South Carolina.

Staff Sergeant George M. Moore, 39137755, Corps of Engineers, 172nd Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 15 October 1944 to 8 March 1945. Entered military service from California.

Staff Sergeant John W. Seneff, 35696349, Corps of Engineers, 147th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 6 June 1944 to 28 October 1944. Entered military service from Indiana.

Sergeant Eugene C. Dunn, 35685048, Corps of Engineers, 147th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against the enemy from 8 June 1944 to 28 October 1944. Entered military service from Ohio.

Technician Fifth Grade Lowell D. Lutz, 32492556, Corps of Engineers, 551st Engineer Heavy Ponton Battalion, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 23 February 1945 in Germany. Entered military service from New York.

Technician Fifth Grade Curley W. Ulrich, 34548572, Corps of Engineers, 551st Engineer Heavy Ponton Battalion, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 23 February 1945 in Germany. Entered military service from Florida.

Private Sidney Grossman, 32524936, Corps of Engineers, 551st Engineer Heavy Ponton Battalion, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 23 February 1945 in Germany. Entered military service from New York.

Private Andrew F. Stoe, 33503561, Corps of Engineers, 551st Engineer Heavy Ponton Battalion, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against the enemy on 23 February 1945 in Germany. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

III. REVOCATION OF GENERAL ORDERS. So much of Section IV, General Orders No 81, this headquarters, 18 March 1945, pertaining to the award of Purple Heart to Private First Class Gorman G. McWhorter, 34328863, Infantry, Headquarters Company, Ninth United States Army, is revoked.
