I. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER) - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

Lieutenant Colonel ROY A TATE, 0376759, Coast Artillery Corps, 390th Anti-aircraft Artillery Automatic Weapons Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 1 August 1944 to 15 September 1944.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Major HARRY SPITZ, 0209984, Medical Corps, 6th Convalescent Hospital, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE, LUXEMBOURG, and GERMANY from 10 August 1944 to 20 April 1945.

Captain FRANK C LATTIMORE, 0472680, Medical Corps, Company "B", 94th Medical Gas Treatment Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in the UNITED KINGDOM, FRANCE, and GERMANY from 1 June 1944 to 15 April 1945.

Captain LYLE H WRIGHT, 01170608, Field Artillery, Company "B", 631st Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in the UNITED KINGDOM, FRANCE, and LUXEMBOURG from 6 August 1944 to 24 February 1945.

Master Sergeant THOMAS E PARLETTE, 33161811, 631st Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in the UNITED KINGDOM and FRANCE from 6 August 1944 to 19 December 1944.

Technical Sergeant FRED F KERCHEVAL, 37651480, Headquarters Detachment, 182d Medical Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE, LUXEMBOURG, BELGIUM, and GERMANY from 5 December 1944 to 8 April 1945.

Private First Class Bonnie Rutledge, 34749254, 3215th Quartermaster Service Company, United States Army. For wounds received as a direct result of enemy action in FRANCE on 16 August 1944.
