AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL

1. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO NS Army, 20 Mar 44, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 44, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Technician Fourth Grade JOHNNIE J MECKA, 38246750, 4th Auxiliary Surgical Group, United States Army. For he roic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the period 24 - 26 March 1.35. Technician Fourth Grade BECKA volunteered as a member of a surgical team being flown to the vicinity of WESEL, GERMANY, to provide medical care for members of an airborne division. Although the rest of the team were either killed or wounded he courageously continued to render aid during the fierce engagement and worked tirelessly for two days and hights despite intense enemy artillery, mortar and small arms fire. Technician Fourth Grade BECKA'S he roic actions and unswerving devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Private First Class ROY O FLOKS, 39575827, Battery C, 558th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States on 19 November 1944. When information was received that the enemy intended to destroy a vital railway tunnel by demolition near FCFBOURG BUDANGE, FRANCE, Private BRCOKS immediately proceeded to the scene. Exhibiting courageous aggressiveness he captured the German demolition crew, with the assistance of a comrade, and prevented them from destroying the heavily mined tunnel. Private BROOKS' heroic actions reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.
