I. AMARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ENO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Mq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

Captain KEITH G VAN MESTE, 0405360, Infantry, Headquarters Company, 23d Infantry Regiment, 2d Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations gainst an armed enemy in GMN ANY. During action near MERGEBURG, GEPMANY, on 13 April 1945, Captain VAN NESTE, with three volunteers, set forth to lar a vitally needed wire line between the regimental and battalic command posts. Although the area was swept by intense hostile 105 mm fire he fearlessly comminued his mission and completed the circuit. Then enemy action created a break in the line he courageously started out alone to repair it but was nortally wounded by an enemy shell. Captain VAN MESTE'S heroic actions and supreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

Second Lieutenant GEORGE F PENMINGTO 1, 01320962, Infantry, Company E, 101st Infantry Regiment, 26th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary horoism in connection with military operations against an armed enomy in LUXEM-DOURG. On 28 December 1944, during action near MOTHUM, LUXIMBOURG, Ligutement PENNINGTON gallantly assumed an exposed position in the face of an enemy counterattack consisting of infantryman and an armored car. He killed three and wounded four of the advancing enemy and although mortally wounded by hostile 20mm fire he couragoously picked up a rocket-launcher and in the face of direct, intense enemy fire knocked out the approaching enemy vehicle. Lieutenant PEMMINGTON died as a result of his wound but his gallant actions and supreme devotion to duty live on as an inspiration to the mon with whom he fought.

Technical Sergeant MOCDROW BUGG, 35460617, Company G, 318th Infantry Regiment, 80th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in Good ANY. On 10 April 1945, when Sergoant BUGG'S platoon was pinned down by intens. fire frem two enomy machine guns during an assault on SCHIRA, GERLAMY, he courageously accompanied his platoon leader on a fla king movement to within thirty yards of the camouflaged enemy positions. Firing his rifle from the hip he fearlessly charged through a hail of fire, silenced the first position and although mortally wounded by a concentration of fire from the other enemy machine gun fought, on with supreme gallantry until he died. Sergeant BUGG'S intrepid, self-sacrificing actions will live on as a constant impiration to his comrades.

Private First Class LOREN E ROWLAND, 37347450, Company F, 395th Infantry Regiment, 99th Infantry Division, United Lates Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in GRNAW. On 27 April 1945, during an assault crossing of the Danube River near MARCHING,

GERMANY, Private ROLLAND'S company was subjected to intense hostile fire which held the beat to which he was assigned against the near shore. With fearless courage he seized an automatic rifle and with utter disregard for his own safety stood in an exposed position and returned the enemy fire. His heroic, unselfish action cost him his life but diverted the enemy's attention and enabled his commades to withdraw to safety. Private ROLLAND'S gallantry and supreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the firest traditions of the military service.

II. NARD OF ROUZE STAR LEDAL - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETC US Army, 20 Mer 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETC US Army, 27 May 1944, a Bronce Star Medal is awarded posthumously for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the period indicated, to:

Staff Sorgeant JACK D ROWER, 16118198, Mendquarters and Service Troop, 16th Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron, Mechanized, United States arry. 1 October 1944 to 22 February 1945 in FRANCE, BELGIUM and CHRISTY.

III. ALED OF FURFLE HEART - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 Sep 1943, as amended, the Purple Heart is awarded to: - July 221645

Technician Fourth Grade GERALD E BRYLIN, 15106512, 102th Signal Repair Company, United States Army. For wounds received as a direct result of enemy action on 29 October 1944 in BRAND, GERMAND.
