## SECTION II - AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS.

1. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

First Lieutenant RICHAPD A REYNOLDS, C1170532, Field Artillery (TD), 607th Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. For extraordinary beroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. During the period 3 December - 4 December 19/4, Lieutenant REYNOLDS heroically led his tank destroyer platoon of the 607th Tank Destroyer Battalion through the heavily defended town of SAARMAUTERN, GERMANY, and across the SAAR RIVER to assist infantry elements in exploiting a bridgehead on the eastern bank. He repeatedly exposed himself to enemy fire while directing his platoon, completely disregarding his own safety. By his many conspicuous acts of heroism and fearless leadership he inspired his men to press forward relentlessly against the enemy. On one occasion, while heavily engaged with stubbornly resisting forces in the bridgehead area, he halted his tank destroyer in an exposed position and personally rescued members of another crew who were trapped in their burning tank destroyer. During subsequent action, while directing fire against enemy pillboxes, Lieutenant REYNOLDS was killed. The supreme devotion to duty and conspicuous heroism many times displayed by this intrepid officer exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

Sergeant ROY E HOLCOWB, 39525060, Company "A", 607th Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 1 December 1944, during an attack against the enemy-held town of ST BARBARA, FRANCE, a platoon of the 607th Tank Dest Battalion was stopped within the town by a strategically placed enemy ke Tank. When it became apparent that the tank destroyer opposing the could not maneuver into a position from which it could fire effective HOLCOMB, with complete disregard for his own safety, obtained a rocket and crawled toward the enemy tank to destroy it or force it to move into position. Covered by friendly small arms fire he crawled to within seventy yards of the tank and opened fire which proved to be ineffective, Undauntethe approached from another direction, and when he was within fifty yards of to retreat, tank he again opened fire, partially disabling the tank and forcing it to the posi-As he made his way back to his platoon, another enemy tank moved into a with a tion previously occupied by the one he had damaged. 

First Sergeant ALGY C SHALKLIS, 20107647, Company "B", 104th Infantry Regiment, 26th Infantry Division, United States Anay. For extraordinary b in connection with military operations against an armed enomy. On 20 N 1944, during an attack against an enomy-held hill near VAHI LES BENT FRANCE, the 1st Eattalion, 104th Infantry Regiment suffered heavy officers and men. Sergeant SHALDHIS, Company "B", 104th Infantry, the critical situation, took command of his depleted company, skilful rerceiving ized it and led the men forward in the attack, under a heavy enemy mortaly reorganrage. The fellowing morning when the Battalion attacked the town of ALBAST bar-FRANCE, Sergeant SHAMEKIIS hereically led his company across five-hundred of open ground, under intense enemy machine-gun cross-fire, and gained end of the town. Determined to hold the ground gained, he deployed he forces in defense against overwhelming odds and then personally led against the enemy forces in an attempt to destroy their tanks. Then enemy fire collapsed the walls of the building he was defending, Sorgean LIS was seriously injured. Despite his wounds, and although suffering gre he continued to lead his men and brilliantly executed an ordered withdrawal w their positions became untomable. Sergeant SHAMEKLIS' inspiring leadership, and his courage and heroic devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.
