I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED STRVICE CROSS.

1. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

Captain JOHN B KELLY, 01285599, Infantry, Company "G", 318th Infantry Regiment, 80th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed energ. On 8 November 1944, Captain KELLY, commanding Company "G", 318th Infantry, was given the mission of leading his men in a crossing of the SELLIE RIVER to seize enemy-held high ground nor cheast of REUVES, FRANCE. Finding the river flooded and the foct bidges that they had intended using, impassable, Captain WILY quickly improvised a bout crossing and led his men under raking enemy mortar and machine-gua. fire to the far shore. There, he reformed his troops and fearlessly led them in the planned assault on the high ground. As the attack stormed up the hill against determined enemy resistance Captain KELLY received severe abdominal wounds but refused to be evacuated. He turned his command over to his executive officer and then, lying in an exposed position, contacted his battalion commander by radio and proceeded to relate a detailed description of the progress of the assault. Although suffering intense pain from his wounds he remained at his. chosen post directing effective artillery fire against the enemy until the assault was completed. Cartain KELIY died a few days later from his wounds. His intrepid leadership, conspicuous courage, and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

2. By Direction of the President and under the provision of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Ho ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Ho ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded to:

First Lieutenant and C mark JR, C358095, Infantry, Company "A", 358th Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 11 November 1944, during action to reduce the heavily defended FORT KCENIGS-MACHER, FRANCE, the advance of Company "A", 358th Infantry was temporarily halted by intense enemy machine-sun fire coming from a strong concrete-shelter position. In full view of the enemy, Lieutenant NEIL made his way to the top of the shelter, ignoring the heavy fire directed against him, and coolly directed the placing of an explosive charge which demolished the entrance. Then,

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while the enemy increased their fire in an attempt to dislodge him, he poured gasoline into a ventilator of the enemy emplacement and threw in a phospherous grenade. He was severely burned in the ensuing explosion but clung to his precarious position and threw another grenade which exploded the gasoline and silenced the enemy fire. Lieutenant NEIL's conspicuous heroism, determination to engage the enemy, and his courageous devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

Staff Sergeant CLYDE E WORMAN, 35206124, Company "A", 10th Armored Infantry Battalion, 4th Armored Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. Sorgeant WORKMANS many heroic acts distinguish him as an outstanding, courageous soldier. On 27 September 1944, Sergeant WORKLAN (then Frivate First Class) was a member of a squad that was holding a defensive position against a determined enemy attack. When his squad leader became a casualty, Sergeant WORMAN assumed command and volunteered to go forward and silence an enemy position from which a heavy mortar barrage was being directed against his squad. He fearlessly crawled forward three-hundred yards, in full view of the enemy, and knocked out the mortar with hand grenades. When the enomy squad attempted to withdraw, he killed several of them with his rifle and wounded the others. On another occasion, Sergeant WORK-MAN advanced alone and personally killed ten of a number of enemy snipers who were harassing his men. Again, when an enemy tank approached his position, Sergeant WORKMAN dashed to a half-track through a heavy enemy barrage and engaged the tank with a fifty caliber machine-gun, setting it on fire. Sergeant WORKMAN's conspicuous courage, many times displayed, and his inspiring leadership and intense devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

Private First Class MILDUR C FYLE, 18198599, Company "C", 134th Infantry Regiment, 35th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 14 November 1944, Private First Class FYLE was advancing with his company against the enemy near PEVANCE, FRANCE. When a series of defensive enemy fexholes were encountered, Private First Class FYLE unhositatingly advanced upon them. His helmet was knocked off by an enemy bullet as he started forward but he went on without it, ignoring the heavy frontal and flanking fire laid down by the enemy. He captured three of the enemy in the first fexhole and sent them to the rear. He coolly advanced upon a second and third fexhole, throwing grenades, and captured two more prisoners. Still advancing, he threw grenades into the fourth fexhole, killing one of the intrenched enemy and capturing another. Private First Class FYLE's courageous determination to engage the enemy, and his conspicuous heroism and inspiring devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE OAK-LEAF CLUSTER - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

Major LOUIS P MARIANO, OllOllol, Corps of Engineers, 168th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at ST VITH, BELGIUM from 17 December 1944 to 22 December 1944.

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III. AMARD OF BROWZE STAR MEDAL - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec 1, Cir 32, My MTO US Army, 20 Mar 1984, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, My ETO US Army, 27 May 1984, a Browze Star Medal is awarded to:

Licutement Colonel WILLIAM R RAINFORD, 0287055, Field Artillory, 734th Field Artillory Battalian, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 22 August 1944; to 7 January 1945.

Lioutement Colonel KENNETH DELL GRACE, 0322584, Medical Corps, 107th Evacuation Hospital, United States Army. For meriterious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and LUXEMBOURG from 18 July 1944 to 17 revember 1944.

Licutement Colonel STANLEY G WILTZ, 0286747, Quartermester Corps, 496th Quartermester Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in Connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 1 September 1944 to 20 December 1944.

United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 30 September 1944 to 1 December 1944.

Major SYDNEY ELLIS, Oh65734, medical corps, 107th Evacuation Mospital, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and LUMENDOURG from 18 July 1944 to 17 Movember 1944.

Jajor HARRY W BREMMAN JR, 0400793, Corps of Engineers, 168th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States at ST VITH, BELIGIUM from 17 December 1944 to 22 December 1944.

Hajor JAMES A REED JR, 0399385, Coast Artillery Corps (AA), Allth Antiair-craft Artillery Cun Pattalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 24 September 1944 to 10 Povember 1944.

Pirst Lieutenant JOHN S RAWLINGS, 01576539, Ordnance Department, 5448th Ordnance Hedium Automotive Maintenance Company, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and LUXZIBOURG from 4 August 1944 to 5 January 1945.

Pirst Lieutenant HOTARD S DOEPKE, 0151.7589, Medical Administrative Corps, Company "A", 94th Hedical Gas Treatment Battalion, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 11 August 1914 to 31 December 1914.

Chief Warrant Officer MILO D WARD, W2106338, United States Army, 107th Evacuation Hospital, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and LUXEIBOURG from 18 July 1944, to 17 November 1944.

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Technical Sergeant KENNETH 3 LUNDINE, 17003017, 107th Evacuation Hospital, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and LUME BOURG from 18 July 1914 to 17 Movember 1914.

Technical Sergeant MORIAN C WACHER, 20654843, Headquarters Third United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and LUXEIBOURG from 1 August . 1914 to 8 January 1945.

Technical Sergeant ARTHUR P SAUNDERS, 32860009, Headquarters Detachment 176th Quartermaster Battalion, Mobile, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 1 August 19/4 to 31 December 19/4.

Staff Sergeant DEVERE S REECH, 37176575, 107th Evacuation Hospital, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and LUTE BOURG from 18 July 1944 to 17 November 1914.

Staff Sergeant POSTON CALLAN, 38039078, Headquarters Third United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FMANCE and LUXEMBOURG from 1 August 1944 to 8 January 1945.

Technician Third Grade WILLIAM A WELSH JR, 18120818, Meadquarters Third United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and LUKENBOURG from 1 August 1944 to 8 January 1945.
