

I. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER) - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the respective periods indicated, to:

Colonel JORIS B RASBACH, C15918, Field Artillary, Headquarters 76th Division Artillery, United States Army. 7 March 1945 to 8 May 1945 in GERMANY.

Colonel CHARLIE WESNER, 016842, Field Artillery (Armored), Headquarters
Reserve Command, 9th Armored Division, United States Army. 26 December 1944 to
8 May 1945 in GERMANY.

Lieutenant Colonel STEPHEN M BATORI, 0358372, Ordnance Department, 701st Ordnance Light Maintenance Company, United States Army. 6 June 1944 to 8 May 1945 in FRANCE, BELGIUM, GERMANY and CZECHOSLOVAKIA.

Lieutenant Colonel RAYMOND B GRAEVES JR, 0351106, Ordnance Department, Headquarters 128th Armored Ordnance Maintenance Battalion, 6th Armored Division, United States Army, 12 October 1944 to 8 May 1945 in FRANCE, BELGIUM, LUNENGOURG and GERMA

Major HARCID L HAUSMAN, 0430761, Chemical Warfare Service, Headquarters 81st Chemical Mortar Battalion, United States Army. 3 October 1944 to 8 May 1945 in FRANCE, BELGIUM, GERMANY and AUSTRIA.

Captain KENNETH-W HODGDON, Oll65511; Field Artillery, Battery A, 314th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army, 20 Nevember 1944 to 8 May 1945 in FRANCE, LUKEMBOURG, CERLANY and AUSTRIA.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL - 1. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant WILBUR CAKES JR, 02008387. Coast Artillery Corps, Battery A, 482d Antiaircraft Artillory Automatic Weapons Battalian (Self-Propelled), United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in HELGIUM. During the enemy counteroffensive from 18 December 1944 to 73 December 1944 in the vicinity of ST. VITH, HELGIUM, Lieutenant (then Staff Sergeant) OAKES exhibited great personal courage and heroic leadership. With utter disregard for his own safety he exposed himself to intense enemy small arms and artillery fire and moved from one gun section to another, giving the men necessary information and encouraging them to carry on against the overwhelming odds. When the platoon commander became a casualty this intrepid officer assumed command of the platoon and led his men in a successful counter— (ever)

attack against the enemy. Lieutenent OAKES! courageous actions and unflinching devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military services.

Technical Sergeant FRANK VOZEL, 38175393, 61st Charical Deject Company, United States Army. For habbic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE. On 12 August 1944, Sargeant VOZEL observed a C-47 Transport arroraft crash in a hearby field. Accompanied by three other soldiers he rushed to the scene and ignoring the imminest possibility of fire or explosion from the gasoline that was leaking over the slane, broke down the door and laboraleusly forced his way through the debris to wach two injured officers. Sergeant VOZEL'S courageous accions were instrumental in evacuating the injured men. His fearless disregard for his personal safety and unflinching devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

Colonel WILLIAM M HAMILTON, 0262501, Coast Artillery Corps, Headquarters 44th Antisircraft Artillery Brigads, United States Army. 21 November 1944 to 21 March 1945 in FRANCE.

Major JOHN M MATER, 0454314, Field Artillery, Headquarters 257th Field Artillery Battelion, United States Army. 1 June 1944 to 8 May 1945 in the UNITED KINGDOW, FRANCE, BELGIUM, LUXEDEOURG and GERTANY.

Captain DARREL B BISHOP, 01104055, Corps of Engineers, Company C, 145th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army. 20 August 19/4 to 20 December 1944 in FRANCE

Captain MORIS G WEST, 0520435, Corps of Ingineers, Headquarters 299th Engineer Combat Battalion, United States Army. 6 June 1944 to 8 May 1945 in FRANCE, BELGIUM HOLLIND, LUXENBOURG and GERMANY.
