AWARD OF DI MINGUISHED SERVICE CPOSS

1. By Direction of the resident and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as axended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 Nay 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

First Lieutenant THOMAS: A DALY, Oldianlo Infantry, Company K, 376th Infantry Regiment. Sith Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in cornection with military operations against an armed enemy in GERMANY. On 25 February 1945, near OCKFEN, GERMANY, Lieutenant DALY courageously volunteered to had a squad to silence two enemy machine guns. Praving withering machine gun and mortar fire he approached the house from which the hostile fire was emanating, silenced the gun with a grenade and captured three prisoners. When fired upon from another house while returning with his prisoners, he fearlossly charged the building, knocked out the hostile machine gun with an anti-tank grenade and captured five more prisoners. Encountering a group of twelve enemy soldiers while searching through the second building, he killed two with his rifle, and was pursuing the other ten when he was killed by sniper fire. Lieutenant DALY'S intrepid actions and indomitable fighting spirit live an as an inspiration to the men with whom he fought.

Technician Fourth Grade MARION J GRASS, 371320A2. Company F, 102d Cavalry Reconnaissance Squadron (Mechanized), nited States Army. For extraordinary hereivm in connection with militar operations against an armed enemy in BMIGIUM. On 5 October 1944, near BULLINGTW, BELGIUM, Technician Fourth Grade GRASS! tank was immobilized by an enemy mine. Exposing himself to intense, close-range here: The machine gun fire, he assisted in removing the severely wounded bow gunner to cover. He again exposed himself to withering enemy fire by manning the anti-circumst machine gun of the tank to kill two enemy soldiers attempting to destroy the tank with rockets. Realizing that his wounded gunner would die from loss of blood in a short time, this intropiu soldier left his position of shelter and assisted in carrying him towards friendly lines. This heroic, unselfish act curt Techinician Fourth Grade GRASS his life but his dauntless courage and supreme devotion to duty will live on as an inspiration to his commades.

First Lieutenant JAMES A KRUCAS, 01321782, Infantry Company G, 16th Infantry Regiment, 1st Infantry Division. United States Army. For extraordinary heroism is connection with military operations against an armed enemy in GERMANY. On 15 October 1944, during a flores enemy counterattack near VERLAUTEMHEIDE, GERMANY, Lieuterant KHUCAS skilfully deployed his outnumbered platoon in defensive to the and courageously advancing alone, using hand grenades, forced the enemy to withdraw. In the ensuing bitter action, this gallant officer personally repolaced four separate hostile attacks, inflicting heavy casualties upon them. After charging to the assistance of a surrounded morter section, he audaciously (over)

rallied his depleted force and counterattacked the numerically superior enemy, clearing them from the area. Lieutenant KRUCAS' heroic, inspiring leadership and dauntless actions are in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service.

Second Lieutenant MICHAEL HRITSIK, 01060133, Infantry, Company F, 319th Infantry Regiment, 80th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in LUXEM-BOURG. On 23 Pacember 1944, Lieutenant HETISIK Red his plateon through a Wathering crossfire of hostile machine guns into the town of HEIDERSCHEID, LUXEMEDURG. Although twice wounded, he courageously engaged three enemy tanks with a rocket-launcher and forced them to withdraw. When the enemy launched a figure counterattack, this gallant officer left the aid station where he was awarting evacuation and aggressively formed rocket-launcher teams that destroyed two astile tanks and repulsed the counterattack. Lieutenant HRITSIKIS heroic, intrepid actions and unflinching devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service.

Private First Class JOHN F MC KEON JR, 42088883, Company L, 395th Infantry Regiment, 99°n Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in CERMANY. On 5 April 1945, 'uring action near GLEIDORF, GERMANY, Private MC KEON'S platoon was pinned down by withcring hostile rifle and machine gun fire. Fearlessly crawling towards the enemy machine gun nest, he was within twenty yards of it when one of the enemy soldiers threw a grenade at him which fell short. He then aggressively hurled one of his own grenades at the emplacement, killing two of the gunners, and courageously charged and killed with fixed bayonet the remaining two enemy crew-men. Private MC KEON'S heroic, dauntless actions enabled his platoon to continue the advance. His indomitable fighting spirit and unflinching devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.
