First Sergeant ALPERT E NO PHEE, 31018558, Company E, 101st Infantry Regiment, obth Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in FRANCE. On 17 Movember 1944, during fierce action near BURGAISTMOFF, FINTOE, First Sergeant (then Technical Sergeant) AC PHEE fearlessly exposed himself to intense enemy machine gum, mortar and tank fire and led his depleted platoon into the bitterly defended town. Then fired upon by a hostile machine gum while he was making a lone reconnaissance, this intropid soldier silenced the gum with accurate rifle and grenado fire. As he had had had men forward, four many tanks opened fire upon them from close range. Arm ag himself with a rocket launcher, he again advanced alone and hitmang two of the tanks forced all of them to withdraw. Sergeant MO PHEETS heroic leadership and unflinching devotion to duty are in keeping with the nighest traditions of the military service.

Tochnician Fourth Grade JOHN L FARREIL, 33429614, Medical Detachment, 101st Infantry Regiment, 26th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in FRANCE. On 19 November 1944, near DORDAL FIRMS, FRANCE, Technician Fourth Grade FARREIL fearlessly ment to the aid of an officer who had been seriously wounded by automatic weapons fire from a concealed hostile position. In the face of this fire, Technician fourth Grade FARRELL calmly remained at the wounded efficer's side administering first aid until he was himself wounded in the shoulder by an enemy granade. When he returned with the officer to his company's position, he refused medical attention in order to continue his unselfish ministrations, even as the snarp, close-range action increased about him. Technician Fourth Grade FARRELL'S heroic actions and unswerving devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Private First Class ALIEN D DRUCKET-OARD, 35885795, Company L, 328th Infantry Regiment, 26th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in CERMAY. On 11 April 1945, during an advance near LIMBACH, CERMAY, Private DRUCKENBOARD was painfully wounded by enemy machine gun fire emanating from a hidden position approximately seventy-five ards from him, which knocked his Bak from his hands. Ignoring his wound, this intrepid soldier gallantly crawled to where his Bak had fallen, and maintaining a deadly hail of fire from his wonton, killed the two enemy machine gunners and forced three other hostile soldiers in nearby positions to surrender. Private DRUCKETBOARD'S heroic actions saved his squad from suffering neary casualties. His dauntless courage and unflinehing devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.
