I. ANNOUNCEMENT OF ASSISTANT CHIEF OF STAFF, G-4. - Colonel GEORGE S SPEIDEL, JR., USAB, General Staff Corps, this Headquarters, is announced as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, Headquarters Third United States Army.

II. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS. - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 52, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant FREDERICK K BAUER, 0526465, Infantry, Company A, 377th Infantry Regiment, 95th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in GERMANY. On 1 December 1944, when enemy armor and infantry in great strength sought to dislodge our forces from the newly-won town of ST BARBARA, GERMANY, Lieutenant BAUER led his reinforced company in a spirited dawn attack which succeeded in clearing the town of all but two hostile tanks. Although suffering from a painful face wound, he organized a volunteer rocket team and advanced with them through a hail of enemy rifle fire to where effective fire could be placed on the hostile armor. Wounded a second time, he refused evacuation until the two tanks had been forced to withdraw under the heavy fire he directed against them. Lieutenant BAUER'S gallant tenacity and unswerving devotion to duty are in keeping with the finest traditions of the military service.

III. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 52, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

First Lieutenant ELMER T COTTON, 01175407, Field Artillery, Detachment I-362, Company F, 3d Military Government Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in GERMANY. From 17 - 22 April 1945, Lieutenant COTTON demonstrated great personal courage and initiative in organizing and maintaining military government administrative establishments in the towns of KOHLSTEIN, HESSENBERG and EZELDORF, GERMANY. As a member of a spearhead military government team with the 14th Armored Division, he contributed much to the success of tactical operations. Lieutenant COTTON'S aggressiveness and loyal devotion to duty reflected great credit upon himself and the military service.

First Lieutenant HAROLD T GARVIN, 0120832, Field Artillery, Battery B, 176th Field Artillery Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in GERMANY. On 4 Apr 1945, when an enemy patrol attacked friendly elements of

an antiaircraft artillery position near SCHIERSCHENDE, GERMANY. Lieutenant CARVIN went to the aid of several comrades who had been wounded in the skirmish. In the face of fierce enemy automatic weapons and small arms fire, he crossed open terrain to where the men lay and finding them unable to walk, administered first aid and carried them to safety. Lieutenant CARVIN'S unflinching courage and loyal devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

First Sergeant JOSEPH A. KESL, 3540466, Infantry 4, 182d Antiaircraft Artillery Autocannon Co., on attached (Sergeant Major), United States Army. For heroic achievement in operations against the Germans against an enemy of the United States in World War II. From 17 to 20 October 1944, when numerically superior enemy forces acting in concert tried to cross the Ardennes into HUYER, BELGIUM, First Sergeant (then Sergeant) KESL displayed great personal courage and leadership ability in directing his company's defense in a vigorous defense of the town. Even as hostile troops tried to encircle his positions, he calmly stood his ground and on one occasion single-handedly thwarted a desperate enemy frontal assault. Sergeant KESL'S aggressiveness and unflinching devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.
