I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS.

1. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

Captain SAMULI T PINCKNEY, 01285294, Infantry, Company "K", 377th Infantry Regiment, 95th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary hereism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 15 November 1944, during savage fighting at MAZIERES-IFS-METZ, FRANCE, Captain PINCKNEY launched his rifle company in a determined assault to destroy the enemy. When an enemy machine-gun position threatened the success of the attack Captain PINCKNEY personally led a small platoon forward and destroyed the gun. During subsequent fighting he was severely wounded from grenad-fragments, but before submitting to evacuation, expertly reorganized his company and issued specific instructions for continuing the attack. The following day, in spite of his wounds, the intrepid captain boldly led his men in an assault on FORT GAMPETTA, and was again wounded. Physically unable to continue, he directed his men to press the attack, but before he could be evacuated he was killed by an enemy mortar shell. Captain PINCKNEY'S inspiring leadership, and his fearless courage and heroic devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Captain HENRY V BAUSHAUSEN, CAO9715, Infantry, 3d Battalion, 359th Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in correction with military operations against an armed enemy. On 11 November 1944, the Commanding Officer and Executive Officer of Company "K", 359th Infantry, became casualties during an attempt to dislodge the stubbornly resisting enemy from a hill near KERLING, FRANCE. Captain EAUSHAUSEN, Lattalion S-3, upon Learning of the situation, assumed command of the company and led it in a renewed attack. He advanced fearlessly at the head of his men, inspiring them by his courageous leader-snip, but fell mortally wounded when only a few yards from the enemy position. His conspaceous bravery and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

2. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, the award of the Distinguished Service Cross to the following named enlieted man on 17 January 1945 is announced:

Statf Sergeant AUBREY G EDMARDS, 38089318, Company "K", 357th Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in

connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 11 December 1944, during an attack by the 357th Infantry against the town of DILLINGEN. GERMANY, a strong group of the enemy approached a pill box which Sergeant EDWARDS and his squad were defending for flank protection of their battalion. Realizing that the pill box could not hold out long against the numerically superior enamy. Sergeant EDWARDS boldly rushed through the doorway of the pill box against which the enemy was directing intense aut. The weapon fire, and took a firing position on commanding fround nearby. Then, in spite of a severe would be had received in his right arm, this intrepid soldler opened fire on the enemy with his rifle, killing seven of them and wounding three. His effective fire enabled his squad members to energe from the pillbox, and together they forced the surrender of the enemy force. Sergeant EDWARDS, conspicious neroism and courageous devotion to duty exemplify the highest treations of the military service.

3. by Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded to:

Lieutenant Colonel, AUTHLY J MARCUN, C19155, Infantry, 2d Battalion, 378th Infantry Regiment. 95th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. The conspicuous heroism and inspiring, fearless leadership Colonel M.ROUN repeatedly displayed while personally leading his battalion of the 378th Infantry against the enemy on 15 November 1944 to relieve besteged forces in BERTELHGE and INDESTANCE, distinguishes him as an outstanding commander. During the action he suffered a severe back wound but refused to be evacuated; continuing to direct the advance of his battalion while being transported on a stretcher through enemy michino-gun and sniper fire. Colonel M.BOUN'S magnificent display of courage, and his intropid leadership and loyal devotion to duty examplify the nighest traditions of the military service.

Private First Class LESTER J LYNCH, 31241,06, Company "C", 610th Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States army. For entraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armo' anemy 'On 15 September 19/4, during a counterattack by the enemy, one of a platect of advancing Cherman tanks was hit and set on fire. Frivate UNOA, 610th Tank Destroyer Pattalion, left the comparative security of his dug in position beside his early destroyer gun and couvageously went to the aid of the crew members trapped in the burning tank. He climbed into the tank and extricated two wounded and dazed men mements before the ammunition in the tank exploded. Private LYNCA coolly administered first aid to the men he had rescued and then braved intense enemy sniper fire to evacuate them to an aid station. His conspicuous bravery and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

II. AVAID OF SILVER STAR - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec 1. Gir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Silver Star is awarded to:

Lieutenant Colonel ROPERT P BOOTH, 0307274, Infantry, 2d Battalion, 359th Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States army. For allantry in action. During the period 9 Povember to 12 November 1944, the const chous heroism repeatedly displayed by Colonel BOC'H in leading the 2d Battalian of the 359th Infantry across the flooded MOCELLE RIVER and against the enemy on the far shore inspired his men to close with the enemy and score decisive victories. He was continually ment where a fighting was heaviest, completely disregarding his own

safety to direct his troops personally. Colonel BOOTH'S conspicuous heroism, and his personal bravery and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

First Sergeant TEA GARLAND, 6643425, Company "B", 372th Infantry Regiment, 95th Infantry Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action on 15 November 1944 and 6 December 1944. The gallant leadership and conspicuous heroism Sergeant GARLAND repeatedly displayed while serving as First Sergeant, Company "B", 378th Infantry, distinguishes him as an outstanding soldier. His bold determination to close with the energy who rever they were encountered was a constant inspiration to his men. Sergeant CARLAND'S heroic accomplishments and his courageous devetten to duty examplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

111. AWARD OF SCIDIER'S MEDAL - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as accorded by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Soldier's Medal is awarded to:

Private First Class, MARION J DZIATKIEWIJZ, 36309040, 576th Ordnance Annunition Company, United States Army. For neroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy on 19 December 1944. The examplary courage, above and beyond the call of duty, which Private PZIATKIEMICZ displayed at the scane of an examinition explosion and fire distinguishes him as an outstanding soldier. With the aid of another enlisted man, completely disregarding his own safety, Private DZIATKIEMICZ risked his life to evacuate a wounded compade from beside a burning ammunition truck moments before it exploded. Her heroism and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Trivate First Class BAYOE BATLEY, 37079662, 576th Ordnance Ameunition Company, United States Army. For heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy on 19 December 1944. The exemplary courage, above and beyond the call of duty, which I rivate BAILEY displayed at the scene of an amounition explosion and fire distinguishes him as an outstanding soldier. With the sid of another enlisted man, completely disregarding his own safety, Frivate BAILEY risked his life to evacuate a wounded comrade from beside a burning amounition truck moments before it exploded. His heroism and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

IV. AWARD OF BROUZE STAR INDIA - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I. Cir No. 32, Mg ETO US army, 20 Larch 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Mg ETO US army, 27 May 1944, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

First lightenent THOMAS J RELJ, 313951, General List, (British Army). Detachment D2D2, Ochmany "K", lot European Civil affairs Regiment, United States Army. For horoic achievement in connection with additary operations against an energy of the United States. On 21 September 1944, Lightenant MEMS displayed exceptional courage and initiative in assisting to remove several cars of assumition from a burning train at ST HIRIEL, FLANCE. His prompt action, without regard to his own safety, undoubtedly saved an important military bridge which was under construction mar the scene of the fire. His utenant MEMS accomplishment morits high commendation.

Lieutenant Colonel GALIF.JOS J KAPOPOULOS, C264450, Medical Corps, 171st Modical Eattalien, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FELNOE and LUX.PSOUFU from 6 August 1944 to 31 December 1944.

First Lieuterant WILLIAM E WELLER, 01547496, Medical Administrative Corps, 109th Evacuation Muspital, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 1 June 1944 to 23 January 1945.

For meritorious survice in connection with rilatory operations against an enony of the United States in FRANCE and LUAFMECUNG from 27 July 1944 to 13 January 1945.
