## I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS.

1. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army. 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

Technical Sergeant IRVING ERICHER, 32272195. Company F. 301st Infantry Rigiment, Sith Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in confection with military operations against an ermed enemy of the United States in GERMANY. On ? February 1945, during an assault against strong enday positions, Tochnical Sergeant BRICKER, who was in command of a platoon of infantry, noticed that enemy snipers were about to ambush the leading squad which had moved too for forward. Fourlandly dashing forward, he killed two onemy with accurate rifle fire. As the negatit continued, an enemy counterattack with six tenks threatened to completely disorganize the platcon. Disregarding the heavy enemy fire, Technical gargeant BRICHOR moved about, rallying his men, pointing out casualties to modical aid men, and directing antitank fire. He alone defended one flank, billing two enemy, wounding one and capturing two. Turning to the opposito flank where the enemy was attempting an encirclement, he continued fighting against overwhelming odds until he was killed. Technical dergeant BRICKER'S defient courage, heroic and inspiring leadership and supreme devotion to duty reflect highest credit upon himself and the military service.

2. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq RTO US Army, 20 March 1914, as amended by Sec I, Gir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded to:

Captain (then Second Lieutement) DAPLHY B TANLOR, 01323045, Infantry, Company G. 359th Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary beroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy of the United States in FRA. On 2) Jule 1944, although still suffering from woulds sustained during energy action, she week previously, Captain, TAYLOR volumbed and to lead a might pater I ant head a territory to ascertain the strength and disposition of the heavily fortified enemy main line of resistance, in port de Bort Castre, France, Una hortocching the energy line of resistance, Unptdin MAYLOR and the two Fullston Non accompanying him wore subjected to intense machine gun ilre. Endeterred, Captain TAYLOR and

his cambanions crawled under the murderous fire to within ten yards of an enemy emplacement. Though severely shaken by six hostile grenades, he courageously moved further into the hostile sector and prepared a map of mortar and artillery positions and the terrain features of the region. When the patrol returned to friendly lines the following day, the accurate data which they had obtained was employed to great advantage in planning a subsequent action which successfully reduced the fortifications and penetrated the enemy defenses. Captain TAYLOR'S determined leadership, aggressive courage and supremo devotion to duty reflect highest credit upon himself and the military service

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 52, 39 ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Bronse Star Medal is awarded posthumously to:

Private First Class THOMAS A JONES, 32795623, Company A, 95th Chemical Mortar Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in GEREWAY. on 13 April 1945, Private First Class JCHAS was serving as Surgicul Technician when an enemy shellburst seriously wounded several of his comrades. Disregarding his personal safety, Private First Class JONES unhesitatingly exposed himself to the enemy fire and began to administer first aid to the wounded. Throughout the continued shelling, he fearworsly remained exposed and treated the wounded until an enemy shell struck only a few inches from him, killing him instantly. Private First Class JONES! steadfast fortitude, great courage and loyal devotion to duty roflect high credit upon himself and the military service.

III. AWARD OF PURPLE I BART MEDAL. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, the Purple Heart Medal is awarded to:

chief Warrant Officer HERBERT E BROD, W2109996, Army of the United States, Hoadquarters, Third United States Army. For wounds received as a direct result of enemy action on 28 December 1944 in FRANCE.
