I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS.

NUMBER

1. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

Second Lieutenant CECIL H ELLER, 0531689, Field Artillery, 423d Armorod Field Artillery Battalion, 10th Armored Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armod enemy. On 26 November 1944, Lieutenant ELLER served as an artillery observer with the 1st Battalion, 358th Infantry, during action against OBERLEUKEN, GERMANY. Men assault infantry elements were pinned down by a heavy enemy mortar fire, this courageous officer, completely disregarding his own safety, advanced to an exposed position and remained there adjusting artillery fire until he was killed. The conspicuous heroism Lieutenant ELLER displayed and his determination and supreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the nightst traditions of the military service.

Sergeant EDW.RD L STANNARD, 20254386, Company "A", 802d Tank Destroyer Battalion, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 8 August 1944, the Tank Destroyer Plateen with which Sergeant STANNARD was cerving was in action against the fortifications at ST MALO, FRANCE. When a strong group of the enemy attacked, forcing the plateer to withdraw, Sergeant STANNARD manned a machine-gun on a half track while another soldier drove the vehicle forward into the face of enemy fire. The courageous sergeant was wounded twice but centinued firing until he was killed. His conspicuous heroism and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Private First Class ANDREW A KALINKA, 32181410, 11th Infantry Regiment, 5th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary hereism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. The conspicuous hereiam Private . KALINKA displayed on 17 September 1944, during action against a powerful enemy attack near COTE DE FEY, FRANCE, distinguishes him as an outstanding soldier. Serving as a light machine gunner with the 11th Infantry Regiment, he courageously held his position in the face of intense enemy fire and maintained a devastating rate of fire with his machine gun. Even when the enemy advanced to within twenty-five yards of his position he continued firing at point blank range until he was fatally wounded. The supreme courage this intrepid soldier displayed and his determination and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the service.

Frivate English & Johnson 39353260, Company "I", 358th Infantry Figurent, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On the night of & December 1944, Private Johnson and members of his plateon were clearing the enemy from the town c. PACKTEN, GERMANY, when they were subjected to fire from a large concrete pillbox which was situated in front of a house. Although in risk of being observed by enc. my snipers in the vicinity, Private Johnson, disregarding his own safety advanced ahoad of the pletoon and constructed the only possible approach to the pillbox, by placia, an elevated plant from a nearby house to the top of the fortification. Aftor crawling along the plank he dropped two groundes down the ventilator and force the sarrender of the occupants. Mis heroic actions and coragoous devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

2. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir Wo. 32, Hq HTC US Army, 20 March 1914, as amended by Sec I, Cir Ho. 50, Hq ETO US army. 27 May 1964, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded to,

Colonel JAMES S LUCKETT, 018209, Infantry, 12th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantr Division, United States Army. For extraordinary horoism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. The heroic, courageous leacership Colonel LUCKETT displayed while commanding the 12th Infantry Regiment in action near MCNTE-BOURGE, FRANCE, on 11 and 12 June 1914, distinguishes him as an outstanding officor. He rejectedly exposed himself to enemy fire to direct the actions of his troops, inspiring thom by his fourloss personal example. His conspicuous hereism and supreme devotion to duty or lify the highest traditions of the military ser-

Staff Sorgeant JOE T RUTHERFORD, 37179228, Company "G", 357th Infantry Regiment 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary horoism in connection with military, operations against an armed enemy. . On 12 Nevember 1944, when Surgeant RUTHERFORD'S squad was pinned down by heavy machine-gun fire during action near K. H. IGSMACHER, FRANCE, he advanced alone to silence the enemy position. As he crawled forward he located and killed three enemy riflemen firing at his men from a truck; continued on and killed two and captured four of the machine-jun crow. Then, locating three more of the enemy attempting to escape, he pinned them down with captured hand groundes until other friendly treeps could eliminate thom. Burgeant RUTHERFORD'S conspicuous heroisia, fourless determination and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Sergoant JCHN Y MUZA, 33926545, Company "G", 359th. Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary hereism in connection with military operations against an armed energy. on 15 December 1914, during action near PACHTEN, GERMANY, Sorgoant MUZA, with an engineer demolition squad, ran three hundred yards across open terrain to a strongly defended enemy pillbox. Then the door of the fortification was blown open he charged fearlossly inside and throw several hand groundes at the defending enemy. When his supply of groundes was exhausted, he obtained more, re-entered the pillbex and by his aggressive actions forced the surrender of 125 of the enemy. Later, Sergeant MUZA again distinguished himself when he fearlessly led three companions against enother fortification and repulsed an enemy counter-attack. His conspicuous hereism, courageous loadership, and leyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

sorgeant Joseph E Williams, 37491590, Company "B", 315th Engineer Combat Battalion, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary hereism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 6 December 1944, during house-to-house fighting in PACHTEN, GERMANY, Sorgeant WILLIAMS volunteered to breach a strong enemy pillbox that was impeding the advance. Advancing against heavy fire he reached the strong point, and, although wounded, succeeded in firing his demolition charge. Refusing evacuation, this courageous soldier advanced against another pillbox, and, although wounded a second time, fired a charge which forced the surrender of sixteen of the enemy. Sergeant WILLIAMS conspicuous hereism, determination, and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Private First Class HARRY ELLIS, 39289588, Company "G", 347th Infantry Regiment, 87th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary hereism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 15 December 1944, the company with which Private ELLIS was advancing near OBERGAILBACH, GERMANY, was pinned down by heavy enemy machine-gun fire. Completely disregarding his ewn safety, this courageous soldier, armed with an automatic rifle, voluntarily advanced alone acress a hundred yards of ground expessed to enemy fire and entered a hedgerow where he destroyed two machine-guns and captured four priseners. His conspicuous hereism, determination, and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Private First Class MILLIAM J ECHEMZIE, 33379823, Company "H", 319th Infantry comment, 80th Infantry Division, United States Army, For extraordinary hereism is connection with military operations against an armod enemy. On 29 December 1944, the enemy launched a strong counter-attack at RINGEL, LUXEMBOURG, threatening the command post of Company "H", 319th Infantry. Private MCKENZIE courageously held his position at the command post; killed three of the enemy, wounded five and forced the remainder to sock shelter in a nearby barn. He then ran to the barn and forced sixteen of the enemy to surrender. Later, when this intropid soldier observed an enemy rocket-launcher team in firing position he crawled within greenade throwing distance and repulsed the attack by killing two of the team and wounding another. The conspicuous hereism Private MCKENZIE repeatedly displayed and his courageous determination and loyal devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.
