# I. AMAZO OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS.

1. By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No, 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

Captain BENJAMIN W ANDERSON, Olillero, Infantry, 13th Infantry Regiment, 8th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism is connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 27 August 1914, during an attack against strongly held enemy positions near BPEST, FRANCE, Captain ANDERSON and two of his squads became isolated from the company. Displaying the highest culties of leadership, the intropid Captain rallied his men and led them through withering fire to the battalion objective; seized a key point and held it for twolve hours despite several determined attempts by the enemy to dislodge him. Captain ANDERSON'S courageous actions paved the way for the ultimate success of his battalion in obtaining its objective, and his fearless, inspiring leadership and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the last traditions of the military service.

talion, 8th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary hereism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 22 June 1944, during action near CHERBOURG, FRANCE, Trivate MATHUES accompanied his wire chief on a mission of regaining a vital communication line. Then the enemy detected and opened fire upon his companion, this soldier, without thought of his even safety, fearlessly ran forward shouting and gesticulating in an effort to divert the enemy's attention to himself. Private MATHUES' courageous action permitted the wire chief to reach a point of safety, but he himself was killed when the enemy directed their fire upon him. His conspicuous hereism and supreme, unselfish devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

# II. AMARD OF SILVER STAR.

By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Soc I, Cir No. 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Silver Star is awarded to:

Private WILLIAM G TAYLOR, 32611848, Medical Detachment, 5th Ranger Infantry Battalion, United States Army. For gallantry in action. During the period 3 to 4 December 1944, Private TAYLOR distinguished himself by his outstanding performance

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of duty while serving as an aid man with Company "F", 5th Ranger Infantry Battalian during an assault on LAUTERBACH, GERMANY. Throughout the fierce action, this gallant soldier moved fearlessly about under mortar and artillery concentrations, exposed to continuous small arms fire, giving aid and comfort to the wounded. His cheerful attitude and conspicuous courage were inspirational to his comrades, and his heroic accomplishments and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

### III. AMARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL.

By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Bronze Star Modal is awarded to:

Captain JAMES THOMAS COPPER JR, 01110425. Corps of Engineers, 553d Engineer Heavy Ponton Pattalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany. On 24-25 January 1945, Captain CONNER twice made his way on foot deep into enemy territory to aid in evacuating valuable engineer equipment which would otherwise have been destroyed or would have fallen into enemy hands. The courage and resourcefulness he displayed, and his initiative and loyal devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military forces.

Private First Class BOBBIE L CAMPBELL, 37524783, Medical Department, 1303d Engineer General Service Regiment, United States Army. For hereic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 13 February 1945, at BOLLENDORF, LUXEMBOURG, Private CAMPBELL courageously, without thought of his own safety, entered an enemy mine field to give aid to a wounded comma His conspicuous hereism and supreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the highe traditions of the military service.

Private First Class MICHAEL DZI ENKA, 31113751, Company "B", 1303d Engineer General Service Regiment, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States. On 22 January 1915, Private First Class DZI ENKA was engaged in clearing an enemy mine field near DIE-KIRCH, LUXEMBOURG. He was severely wounded by an exploding S-mine, but courageously remained at his task and explained the pattern of the mine field to his comrades before he would permit himself to be evacuated. His determination and heroic devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

Private First Class GORDON R STRAND, 36727854, Headquarters and Service Company, 553d Engineer Heavy Penton Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in Germany. On 24-25 January 1945, Private STRAND twice made his way on foot deep into enemy territory to aid in evacuating valuable engineer equipment which would otherwise have been destroyed or would have fallen into enemy han as. The courage and resourcefulness he displayed, and his initiative and leyal devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military forces.

Company "A", 33d Signal Construction Eattalian, United States Army, For moritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE from 10 August 1944, to 22 September 1944.
