AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS

1. By direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir No. 32, Hq ATO US Army, 20 Larch 1944, as smeaded by Sec I, Cir No. 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

First Lieutenant VITAVON L AD ARDS, 01011342, Infantry, (Armored), Company "B" * Tank Battalion, 6th Armored Division, United States Army. For extraordarry heriosm in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 1: Movember 1944, enemy forces defending the NIED FRANCAISE RIVER withdrew under pressure of an attack by the 6th Armored Division. A vital bridge near HAN-SUR-NIED, FRANCE, remained intact. Lieutenant EDMARDS, a platoon leader of Company "B", ** Tank Battalion, was given the critical mission of crossing with his platoon to establish a bridgehead on the far side. The bridge was under direct fire from small arms, antiaircraft guns, field artillery and the 88mm weapons of enemy Tiger Tanks. Lieutenant EDVALUS assembled the commanders of his four tanks, briefed them as to the assault and the importance of their mission. Scorning personal danger he led his platoen onto the bridge, standing in the turret of his tank to direct the attack. Leading the advance Lieu's nant . ED WRDS personally destroyed two enemy rocket-launcher teams with machine-gun fire. As his tank approached the enemy end of the bridge, and while firing on an enemy machine-gun position, Lieutenant EDWARDS was killed by fire of an enemy sniper. Lieutenant EDWARLE! outstanding courage, inspirational leadership and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service of the United States.

Private EDGAR THILL, 31269360, Medical Detachment, 11th Infantry Regiment, 5th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary horoism in connection with military operations against an armed energy. On 8 Sectember 1944, the 11th Infantry Regiment, with which Private HILL was serving as a medical aid man, was engaged in a fierce attack against the enemy near DOMACT, FRANCE. Many soldiers fell wounded and Private HILL volunteered to go forward under the withering enemy fire to administer first aid. He courageously remained at his forward position under fire throughout the night, aiding the wounded. During a furious enemy counter-attack, he courageously made his way forward beyond the front lines to answer to a wounded soldier's call, ignoring the intense enemy fire. While Private HILL was administering aid to the wounded solder both of them were killed by a burst of enemy automatic fire. The supreme sacrifice Private HILL made above and beyond the call of duty; his intrepid courage and heroic devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

First Lieutenant JAMES D JACKSON, 01030255, Cavalry, Troop "D", ** Cavalry

For extraord mary herois... in connection with military creations against an aimed enemy. On 1 September 1944, Lieutenant Jacobs brillianaly led a plateon of the work (avalry Reconnaissance Squadron (Rechanized) on a during mission to reconneiter a bridge across the MOSFILE MIVER at THIOHYMILE, FPANCE, then deep in enemy territory. Instituted by the daring example of their intropid leader, the plateon fought its may to the bridge, inflicting great destruction on the opposing enemy forces. Upon reaching the bridge lieutenant JACKSON ensuranted from his vehicle, ignoring the intense enemy fire, and by hold, marsh action prevented the enemy from detenating preserved demolition the mass. He was wounded twice while crossing the bridge but continued to direct the actions of his plateon despite his wounds. icutenant JACKSON's inspining, fearless leadership; his courage and supreme devotion to duty examplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.

Staff Sergeant FRLDWICK H FWERSON, 36600670, Company "K", 377th Infantry Begiment, 95th Infantry Division. United States Army. For extraordinary neroism in connection with military operations against an armed energy. During the asscult on FCRT Garbetta, FRANCE, on 17 November 1944, the commanding officer of Company "K", 377th Infantry was killed. Sorgeint HITERSON, a squad leader in the Company, quickly reorganized the troops around him and vi orously pursued the attack. During the fighting that ensure Sergeent PATERSON repeatedly exposed himself to the intense enemy fire, inspiring his men by his fearless leadership. he personally destroyed two enery cutomatic-weapon positions and later skilfully conducted an ordered withdratal of his plateon. On 21 Hovember Sergeant PETERSON again distinguished himself by fearlessly leading a three-man patrol into an enery-defended underground hospital installation in the METZ garrison where the Commanding General of the Garrison was alleged to be. The patrol, under his intrepid loadership, fought their way to the installation, oversewered the guards at the entrance and took the general prisoner. Sergeant PIMINSON's outstanding heroism, many times displayed, his courageous, inspiring leadership and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States. -

Technical Sergeant RUDOLFI M SCHULLER, 35316064, Company "L", 379th Infantry Regiment, 95th Infantry Division, United States Army. For entraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On the night of 6 November 1944, while approaching the outer fortifications of FORT JEANNE D'ARC, FIGURE, Lading his compat patrol, Sergeant SCHULLER was severely wounded by a burst of enemy machine-gun fire. Although bleeding profusely from his wounds and suffering intense pain, Sergeant SCHULLER picked up the sub-machine gun which had been jarred from his hands and fired a full clip of amountain into the enemy position in front of him, silencing the machine-gun. He continued to direct the fire and revenent of his plateon despits his wounds until he collapsed from less of blood. Sergeant SCHULLER's inspiring leadership, his heroic determination to close with the enemy and his supreme devotion to duty exceptify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States.


Private First Class LOYD G ZENNER, 35709883, Company "G", 357th Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary neroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 29 September 19/4, Frivate First Class Z.IV.IR was leading a ten-man patrol on a night reconnaissance in the vicinity of RICHLOUT, Fhal'CE. While crossing a narrow foot

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bridge across a canal, well ahead of his patrol, he was challenged by a sentry in an energy outpost on the far side. Though realizing that his actions would draw energy fire, Private First Chass ZHNER opened fire with his automatic rifle and charged furiously across the bride directly toward the energy. The energy immediately opened firs with a machine-gun and rifles. Private First Chass ZHHMER, after expending his magazine of a munition, plunged into the energy position and violently wrested the machine-gun from the bewildered gunner. He then silenced only small arms fire by throwing two grenades into a nearby house, reloaded his automatic rifle and killed the floring machine-gunner. Private First Class ZENCL's outstanding heroism; his courageous determination and zealous devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United Status.
