I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded to:

Technician Fifth Grade WILLIAM G REA, 6977294, Medical Detachment, 11th Infantry Regiment, 5th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in FRANCE. During Moselle River crossing operations near DORNOT, FRANCE, 8 to 10 September 1944, Technician Fifth Grade REA displayed the highest courage in aiding and evacuating the wounded. Heedless of his personal safety he constantly braved intense enemy fire, repeatedly evacuating casualties from beyond the main line of resistance. On one occasion he personally carried a wounded soldier three hundred yards under fire, and at another time he evacuated a large number of soldiers, making three river crossings under heavy fire. The unselfish courage this soldier displayed, his heroic determination and loyal, untiring devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

II. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to:

Private First Class SPENCER W MORTEN JR, 16087976, Medical Detachment, 26th Ordnance Battalion, United States Army. For heroic achievement in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE. On 5 March 1945, near METZ, FRANCE, Private MORTEN displayed great courage, above and beyond the call of duty, in attempting to render aid to a soldier whose he lay wounded in a mine field. His heroism and loyal, unselfish devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

Master Sergeant EDWIN A MURPHY, 33201005, 101st Evacuation Hospital, United States Army. For meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in FRANCE and BELGIUM from 1 June 1944 to 1 January 1945.

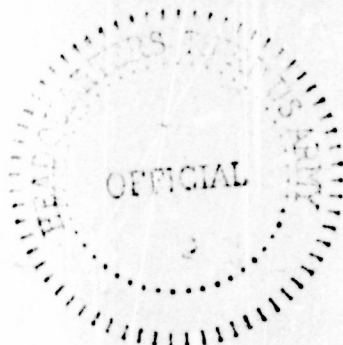
