I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec 1, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec 1, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant MYRON A MEARS, 01055385, Infantry, Company "K", 417th Infantry Regiment, 76th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 13 February 1945, during action against Siegfried Line fortifications near ECHTERNACHBRUCH, CERMANY, Lieutenant MEARS lead assault squads in daring action against three strongly defended emplacements, capturing them and fifteen of the enemy. On 15 February he led his plateon through withering machine gum fire against other emplacements, inspiring his men by his bold, fearless leadership. He singlehandedly assaulted one of the pillboxes, armod only with a jammed carbine and a handgrenade and forced the surrender of its nine defenders. The heroic actions of this gallent officer mark him as an outstanding leader. His determination and courageous devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Technical Sergeant DEESIE H TALLEY, 34107064, Company "G", 12th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in LUXEMBOURG. On the evening of 21 January 1945, Sergeant TALLEY'S company held high ground overlooking the enemy-held town of FOUHREN, LUXEMBOURG. When Sergeant TALLEY observed a force of enemy infantrymen advancing to attack his company he hurled two granades at the group, wounding two and driving the remainder to cover. Then, braving small arms and artillery fire he took an exposed position upon a hedgerow and delivered such effective automatic rifle fire that he killed two, wounded four more of the enemy and forced the others to withdraw. His daring action undoubtedly saved his company from serious losses. His courage and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

Staff Sergeant WILEY J INGRAM, Hold 150, Company "A", Lith Engineer Combat Battalion, Lith Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in LUXEMBOURG. On 18 January 1915, Sergeant INGRAM'S engineer plateon was assigned the mission of ferrying assault infantrymen across the Sure River near MOESTROFF, LUXEMBOURG. When the plateon leader became a casualty Sergeant INGRAM assumed command. Intense enemy fire had damaged the boats and forced the assaulting personnel to cover, but the Sergeant hastily improvised crossing rafts. Then, stending fully exposed he coelly organized a shuttle system, ferrying men and supplies to the far shore, evacuating wounded on the return trip. Machine gun fire was directed against him, rocket and morear shells ourst so close that he was hidden from view but he held his past, encouraging and inspiring the men by his bold, fearloss example. His heroic action assured the success of the mission. His determination and courageous devotion to duty examplify the highest traditions of the military service.
