I. AMARD OF SILVER STAR (CAN-LEAF CLUSTER) - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, in addition to the Silver Star previously awarded, a Bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded to:

Second Lieutenant WILLIAM J CANADA, Oll13626, Corps of Engineers, Company "C", 25th Armored Engineer Pattalion, 6th Armored Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in GERMANY. On 27 February 1945, Lieutenant CANADA commanded a platoon of the 25th Armored Engineer Battalion during river-crossing operations near HEILHAUSEN, GERMANY. While reconnoitering he discovered a ford crossing which had not been cleared of mines, and without hesitation he volunteered to lead infantry and engineer troops across. As the troops approached the far bank with Lieutenant CANADA in the lead the enemy opened fire severely wounding him, but through his fearless leadership the objective was gained. The courage he displayed and his heroic devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Silver Star is awarded to:

Major General HARRY J MALONY, 03385, United States Army, 94th Infantry Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action. General MALONY, commanding the 94th Infantry Division, displayed great skill and courage while leading his troops in action near NENNIG, GERMANY, on 25 January 1945. When assault units of his division were temperarily halted by stubborn enemy resistance, General MALONY assumed personal command. Eraving German artillery, mortar and small arms fire he urged his men forward in a removed attack, inspiring them by his bold, fearless leadership. General MALONY'S skill and daring, and his cutstanding leadership abilities and loyal, courageous devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.

Captain CHARLES DE M BARNES, 01284450, Infantry, CSS Detachment, Third United States Army. For gallantry in action in GERMANY. On 25 March 1945, Captain BARNES, accompanied by five volunteers, crossed the Rhine River to the enemy shore, risking enemy fire, ambush and certain terture if captured, to recever two intelligence agents who possessed valuable information. The mission that Captain BARNES undertook without regard for his own safety was completely successful and the information gained proved of great value during an ensuing attack by the

145th Infantry Regiment. The courage Captain BARNES displayed, his skill and initiative and level devotion to duty exemplify the highest traditions of the military service.

Tochnician Fifth Grade R.YMOND M MCFADDEN, 39571658, Battery "A", 119th Antiaircraft Artillery Gun Battalion, Mebile, United States Army. For gallantry in
action in FRANCE. While enroute from COUNTANCES to AVRANCHES, FRANCE, on 1 August
1944, the antiaircraft artillery gun battalien with which Technician MCTADDEN was
serving as a truck driver was subjected to an enemy air attack. Without hesitation, Technician MCFADDEN manned a cab-mounted fifty caliber machine-jun and
engaged the attacking aircraft. While replanishing his supply of ammunition, a
nearby pile of abandened hand grenades expleded, wounding him severely. He remained at his post despite his wound and continued to fire at the enemy until he
fell unconscious at his gun. The determination Technician MCFADDEN displayed and
his apprage and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the
military service.
