MEDICAL ORDER

- SECTION I - Award of Distinguished Service Cross (Posthumous).
SECTION II - Award of Silver Star.
SECTION III - Award of Bronze Star Medal.

I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS (POSTHUMOUS). By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

Technical Sergeant HARRY GOODMAN, 15054606, Company D, 330th Infantry Regiment, 83d Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in GERMANY. On 5 December 1944, when strong enemy forces penetrated deep into the flanks of positions near GROSSHAU, GERMANY, Technical Sergeant GOODMAN, although painfully wounded in his left arm, gallantly refused evacuation in order to lead his depleted force in a bitter, close-range defense against the attackers. With his gunner and assistant severely wounded, he picked up his machine gun and advancing to an exposed position, placed such devastating fire against a hostile machine gun emplacement that it was totally reduced. Although wounded again when he became the target of concentrated enemy fire, he tenaciously stood his ground until killed by an enemy rocket. Technical Sergeant GOODMAN'S courageous determination, his aggressiveness and supreme devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the military service.

II. AWARD OF SILVER STAR. - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Silver Star is awarded to:

Technical Sergeant MOODY TURBIVILLE, 34107089, Headquarters Company, 1st Battalion, 330th Infantry Regiment, 83d Infantry Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in FRANCE. On 9 July 1944, after his battalion had been halted for two days by enemy tanks in prepared positions near HOTOT FRANCE, Technical Sergeant TURBIVILLE went forward under heavy hostile artillery and mortar fire to the positions of a friendly company. Finding the company in a disorganized condition, he hastily reformed the platoons and dispatched a rocket team to destroy an advance enemy tank and thus afford an avenue for a new attack. When both men of the team were severely wounded, he administered first aid to them and then crawled to an exposed position and silenced the hostile tank. Technical Sergeant TURBIVILLE'S heroic leadership enabled his comrades to resume the attack; his courage and outstanding devotion to duty exemplify the finest traditions of the military service.

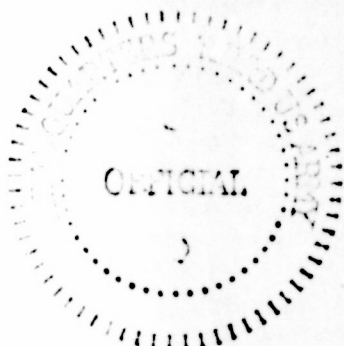
GO 321, Hq Third US Army and Eastern Mil Dist, 11 Nov 45, cont'd.

Private First Class JAMES G ROGERS, 34498885, Headquarters Company, 2d Battalion, 301st Infantry Regiment, 94th Infantry Division, United States Army. For gallantry in action in GERMANY. On 19 February 1945, during a mine-laying operation along an approach to FRIEDENBERG, GERMANY, Private First Class ROGERS and his party suddenly received heavy enemy fire from a building fifty yards to their right, which pinned down one man and wounded another. Without hesitation, Private First Class ROGERS charged the building and with accurately thrown hand grenades, forced an entrance. He succeeded in killing two of the hostile soldiers holding the house and captured three others. He then proceeded alone with mine-laying operations. Private First Class ROGERS' heroic disregard for his own safety; his aggressive actions and loyal devotion to duty reflect great credit upon himself and the military service.

III. AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL. - By Direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec 1, Cir 52, Hq ETO US Army, 20 March 1944, as amended by Sec 1, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States during the respective periods indicated, to:

Major MARSHALL J MANTLER, 01293078, Infantry, Headquarters Third United States Army. 15 September 1944 to 8 May 1945 in FRANCE, BELGIUM, LUXEMBOURG, GERMANY, CZECHOSLOVAKIA and AUSTRIA.
