I. AWARD OF DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS.

1. By direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 2 har 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded posthumously to:

Staff Sergeant WILLIAM A DELMONT, 32368386, Infantry, Company "I", **** Infantry Regiment, United States Army. For extraordinary horoism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. On 10 July 1944, during the act on in the vicinity of IA MAYE DE PUITS, FRANCE, two platoons of Company "I" were pinned down by fire from three well concealed enemy machine-gun positions, in addition to heavy fire from mortars, artillery, grenades, and snipers. Sergeant DELMONT (the Private First Class) rallied his platoon and led an assault on the enemy positions, displaying the highest degree of courage and leadership. He continually covered the movements of other men, clearing out hedgerows and killing snipors. Upon observing a squad of men entering terrain which he reclized was covered by enemy machine-gun fire, Sergeant DELMONT, although under enemy fire himself, made his way to the men, warned them of their danger, and led them to a safer position. He completely routed the enemy with his platoon and personally killed at least five snipers. During this engagement Sergeant DEIMONT captured two German prisoners. The conspicuous leadership of Sergeant DELMONT, his aggressive, heroic determination, and his surreme devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the Armed Forces of the United States.

2. By direction of the President and under the provisions of Sec I, Cir 32, Hq ETO US Army, 20 Mar 1944, as amended by Sec I, Cir 56, Hq ETO US Army, 27 May 1944, a Distinguished Service Cross is awarded to:

Lieutenant Colonel FRIDERICK H LOCAIS, C280778, Infantry, *** Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed energy. On 12 July 1944, in vicinity of IA VELAISSERIE, FRANCE, Lieutenant Colonel 12 MIS, Executive Officer, *** Infantry, assumed temporary command of a much-depleted Infantry Battalion. Finding the battalion pinned to the ground by heavy, close-range, enemy fire, Colonel LOCMIS personally led four medium tanks forward to a position some 40 yards in front of our lines. Although on foot and under intense fire, Colonel LOCMIS directed the fire of the tanks on the enemy positions until they were reduced. He then moved across an open field covered by enemy fire and assembled a group of ten men with which he returned to assist the advance of the tanks. As a result of this officer's heroic efforts and unyielding determination the battalion reached and held

its objective although the total strength of its rifle companies was less than that of two full strength platoons. Colonel LOOKIS' brilliant and courageous leadership and his personal heroism exemplify the highest traditions of the service.

Captain LELOY R TOND, 0370275, Infantry, ** Infantry Regiment, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy. on 4 July 1944, Captain POLTD was commanding the 1st Battalion, ** Infantry Regiment, advancing in the vicinity of PRETO: WRA CE. When his commend was primed down by heavy mortar and machine-gun fire, Captain PCND unhesitatingly and with utter disregard for his own safety, climbed a tree and from this exposed position directed effective artillery and small arms fire against the enemy, permitting his troops to advance. Later, upon encount ig a strong onome position on commanding terrain which halted the advance of his troops, Captain POTD organized his command for attack, then personally skirted a hedgerow to within a few yards of an enemy machine-gun which he dilenced with hand grenades. He returned to his troops to obtain more grenades and again advanced against the enemy positions, leading his men in a renewed assault, and personally put a second machine-gun out of action, killed one of the energy with pistel fire and routed others by his bold actions. The fearless courage of Captain Fond and his inspiring, heroic leadership exertlify the highest traditions of the military service of the United States. :

First Serguant JOHN R MORTON, 20716654, Field Artillery, ** Armored Field Artillery Battalion, 6th Armorea Division, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy in the vicinity of PONTORSON, FRANCE, on 1 August 1914. After his half-track was hit by an 60 m shell, Sergoent Inprov abandoned the vehicle, and started to aid the wounded personnel. While so doing, a bullet passed through his helmot, and, looking up, he saw enemy soldiers charging with bayonets. He fired on them with his carbins until it was omety then took a sub-machine gun and advanced while firing. In the action he accounted for 26 enemy dead and greatly contributed to re tralizing an energy ambush. His gallantry and aggressiveness reflects great or dre upon himself end is in keeping with the finest traditions of the military 2017166e

Private First Class TED HEFLEY, 3823709L, Coast Artillery Corps, ** Anitiar Fast artillory Automotic Wompons Battalion, United States Army. For extraand the heroism in connection with military operations against an armod enemy. or to Appear 1941 in the vicinity of MCPD DU CUERRE, FRANCE, Private HEFLEY'S for position was attacked by an onong patrol during the hours of darlmess Although groundes were thrown into the position and continuous bursts on, machine pistol five were received, but HEFLEY ran through this fit madding. gun with which he opened fire 'spon the energy. Although wounds the machine gan jamed, he employed as 12 har with such effect that ... was broken up. Fvt HEMET'S courageous action was largely instrumental in disporsing the energy force and in saving the lives of his comrades. His courageous accions exemplify the finest traditions of the military forces of the United Sintas.

Lioutenant Color of FREDERICK H LOOMIS, 6280778, Infantry, ** Infantry Rogimust, 90th Infantry Division, United States Army. For gallentry in action on 9 July 1914 in the FORST DE MONT CASTRA, FRANCE, Lieutenant Colored LOOMIS, then Regimental Exactive Officer, ** Infantry, took summand of the

whon only five officers remained in the Estislien. Finding the advance of one of its companies held up by two energy machine-guns, Colonel LOCHIS, personally leading a squad, crawled to within 30 yards of one gun and put it out of action with grenades. He then directed the fire of the squad on the second gun and silenced it. The actions of Colonel LOUIS during this period were directly responsible for the combat successes of this regiment. His outstanding gallantry ad hereism vere an inspiration to his officers and men, and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service.
